

I LOVE EU? A PERFORMATIVE EXAMINATION

Exactly 10 years after the EU received the Nobel Peace Prize, a group of international actors sets off on a search for the status quo. They have collected the perspectives of EU citizens and non-EU citizens over the course of 50 interviews and bring them on stage in an open and interactive production directed by Daniel Brunet.

What remains of the "six decades that have contributed to the development of peace and reconciliation, democracy and human rights in Europe" that motivated the Nobel Prize Commission to make their decision in October 2021?

Voices from the center and margins of the EU alongside voices from, for example, Armenia, Bosnia, China, India, Iran, Kazakhstan, Turkey and Ukraine enter into conversation with each other in a scenic panorama, allowing us to share in their experiences, good and bad alike, as well as their tears and traumas, their analyses, prognoses and hopes.

Can the European Union be a global inspiration for a peaceful postnational world? Is it the *non plus ultra* of what the continent learned from two world wars? Or is it an incredibly strained construct that falls apart at the first signs of a crisis? In light of the human rights catastrophe at the external borders of the European Union, *I Love EU*? asks for a position.



Follow his first engagements at repertory and ensemble theaters in Darmstadt, Pforzheim and Heidelberg, he decided to work in the independent performing arts community. Since then, he has collaborated and performed in numerous productions by a variety of groups, including Post Theater and Bernadette La Hengst at many theaters, including Sophiensæle, Forum Freies Theater Düsseldorf, Heimathafen Neukölln, Theaterdiscounter Berlin or Theater Rampe in Stuttgart. Patrick Khatami contributed a piece of writing on the topic of alleged foreignness to the anthology Schaffen wir das?, published by Armin Fuhrer and Christian Nawrocki.



Ariel Nil Levy was born in Tel Aviv in 1977 Tel Aviv and has been based in Germany for the last 22 years. Ariel is a producer, writer, actor and teacher who studied theater and voice work in Tel Aviv and Germany. Ariel is also known as the post-drag figure Anali Goldberg. Ariel played a lead role in the film Murer: Anatomie eins Prozesses, which won the 2019 Deutscher Schauspielpreis in for best ensemble. Ariel has worked at a wide variety of theaters, including Deutsches Theater, Volksbühne am Rosa-Luxemburg-Platz, Maxim Gorki Theatre, Radialsystem, HAU and Schauspielhaus Wien.
